



Multiple-School Groups Career

The mission of Moms In Touch International, an interdenominational prayer ministry, is to impact children and schools worldwide for Christ by gathering mothers to pray (weekly is optimal). Mothers of adult children who are no longer in school can still be praying for this important season in their child's life. A Career Group is two or more mothers in the same geographic area who meet to pray for their grown children who are in the career stage of their lives. In keeping with the mission of Moms In Touch, multiple-school groups that have no naturally designated school to pray for will choose a school in their area which does not have its own MITI group, or their child's alma mater and pray on behalf of the teachers, the administration and students during intercession.

To Begin

- Read the *MITI Booklet* thoroughly and become familiar with the *Four Steps of Prayer* and *One Accord Praying*.
- Agree with the MITI Statement of Faith.
- Become familiar with the Core Values of Moms In Touch (www.MomsInTouch.org>About Us).
- Abide by MITI Policies.
- Ask God for at least one other mother with whom you can pray.
- Choose a place and time that are convenient for you to meet.
- Register the group at www.MomsInTouch.org: include the leader's name and information.
- Encourage your members to go online and register as a member, or with their permission you may register them as members on their behalf.

Helpful Suggestions

During the intercession time, please consider the following:

- Have each member choose one child to pray for that week.
- Pray for the chosen school each week.
- Divide into smaller groups of twos or threes if the size of the group allows.
